ARGUMENT.

FLORA has been chosen Queen of the May, and the revels are about to commence. The proceedings are interrupted by the arrival of the Pedlar, who states that Prince Henry is approaching to attend the marriage of Flora to Sir Arthur, his favourite yeoman. Sir Arthur is in the meantime detained at Court. The Villagers make haste to receive the Prince, and Elgiva repeats Old Oscar's Rhyme, the riddle contained in which seems about to be solved. The Prince arrives, and pays homage to the Queen of the May. In the evening, while Flora is walking alone in the wood, the Chief of the Robbers presents himself in disguise, and on stating that he has lost the path, Flora accompanies him a short distance and points out the road to him. Here the Robber discloses his identity and carries off Flora to his forest home. On the discovery of Flora's disappearance, consternation prevails in Ardenlea, but the Pedlar devises a plan for her rescue, and departs with the Prince, amid the prayers of the villagers for his success. The Pedlar presents himself at the Robber's home, and is admitted as one of the Robber Band. He tells the Chief of Flora's disappearance, and states that Prince Henry is offering £10,000 for her ransom. The Chief resolves to talk about the matter some other time, and meantime, all the robbers retire to rest. Flora meets Elsie, another captive maiden; and the Pedlar appears and informs them that measures are being taken for their rescue. The Prince and Pedlar next meet the Robber Chief to negotiate Flora's ransom. The Robber, seeing that the Prince is unarmed, takes him prisoner. The Prince now resorts to strategy, and requests a parting interview with Flora, which is granted by the Robber. The Prince finds Elsie, and recognises in her his long-lost love. She does not recognise him, and he finds out that she still remains true to him. The Prince now persuades the Robber to exchange dresses. This done, he overpowers him, and has him bound by the latter's men, who do not now recognise their master in the Prince's garb. The counterfeit robber next gives orders to the Pedlar to hasten to Ardenlea and have a rich feast prepared at his expense. This is done, and after the repast is over, he throws off his disguise, and discloses himself as Elsie's old lover. He next pardons the Robber Chief and his men, who are so struck with the Prince's generosity that they declare they will always follow him. The Pedlar now tells his story. Referring to Lord Athelstone, whose daughter had been stolen away, and who had thereafter shut up his castle and had not been again heard of, the Pedlar now declares that he is Lord Athelstone, and that Elsie is his daughter. The double wedding takes place, and the Rhyme of Ardenlea is thus explained by events.
