

NETS BULLETIN 1800, 6TH MAY, 1926.

Lord Chamberlain announces that Court arranged to be held at Buckingham Palace on May 14th and 15th are postponed until further notice.

House of Commons today. Prince of Wales and Duke of York were present when debate on motion for authorising continuation of Emergency Regulations was resumed. Warm discussion ensued over Labour Members' objections to regulations dealing with protection of property. Mr. Ducey saw in regulations attempts to enable coal owners to fill pits with blacklegs and warned the Government this would lead to trouble. Sir Douglas Hogg, Attorney General replying said suggestion that people should not be allowed to continue in business because a body of Trade Unionists had forbidden it was the best justification of this regulation. There were loud Ministerial Cheers and angry Labour cries. Mr. Mardy Jones said hotly that Miners Federation took up Sir Douglas Hogg's challenge and declared every miner would do their utmost to prevent mineowners working blackleg labour. Regulations were a "Scrap of Paper" as far as the miners were concerned. Mr. Jack Jones warmly condemned regulations. Labour amendments to regulations were rejected by 317 votes to 55.

General assembly of Presbyterian Church of England at Liverpool today adopted resolutions on crisis and requested Ministers to feed them from the pulpit on Sunday night.

Swansea strikers procession. Big demonstration of strikers marched through Swansea streets to Victoria Park where a sports programme was arranged. Banners were carried but crowds were good humoured. Cricket and Football matches are being arranged.

Vegetables held up. Continental fruit, green vegetables and potatoes are staying at Hull owing to refusal of dockers to unload ships. Stocks are being removed without further trouble by road transport.

Economy at Banks. London Joint Stock Banks are authorised to reissue Bank of England notes to headquarters as is usual practice. Treasury notes which in ordinary course would have been withdrawn from circulation owing to their dilapidated condition will be reissued during strike.

Some newspapers are publishing evening editions today in large numbers "British Worker" the Workers newspaper succeeded in their enterprise to publish a news bulletin and issued 320,000 copies which were bought as fast as they could be. It was again issued this afternoon as an evening paper.
