SITUATION AT IDINBUACH. Some further disturbances occurred at Edinburgh last evening arising out of the Strike, stones were thrown at Corporation buses, the police dispersed the demonstrators and nine arrests have been made. SCINGS AT MIDDLESBORG. There were disturbances last night at Middle bore where an attempt was made to hold up a passenger train but the crowd eventually dispersed after having been harangued by the Mayor and the Members of the Town Council. Demonstrations had been made outside the Branch Office of the local newspower and inanother part of the town a motor bus was molested but order, however was soon restored. MRS. STANLIY BALDWIN has organised a transport service for conveying business remen and girls living in the suburbs to and from their . blice of business. This princially effects women and girls whose salaries might other ise be jeopardised. NAVY AND ARMY PENSIONERS AND THE STAIKE. The Executive of the National Association of Army and Navy Pensioners recommend their members to render every assistance in their power during the period of the National Emergency. OWNERS OF MOTO I CARS, which might be damaged by irresponsible parties should extenine their policies to see if they are covered by risks rising out of the strike. THE COLONIAL WOOL MERCHANTS ASSCRIATION have decided to postpone indefinitely the public sale of wool and sheepskins until such times as circumstances permit of resumption. CHIEF CIVIL COMMESSIONER announces two men have been arrested in Mirylebone today for selling leaflets declaring that the Liverpool Police have some cuts on strike. There is no truth the tower in the allegation and the two men will appear tomorrow morning at the Maylebone Police Court. THE L.C.C.C. againstarted up two routes at P. peleck this morning Over one thousand trained men are now available at the volunteer training centre at Chiswick. Services will be introduced as quickly as men can be passed through the training centre. Buses will be worked from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. unless otherwise stated. RAILWAY INFORMATION BURGAU. Southern Railway announces that additional services for today have been arranged. Triin services for today in London and the Provinces are being maintained and additional trains are being added in all parts of the country. In the Home Counties branch lines are being re-opened. Additional trained enginemen are now avilable which considerably eased the situation and the prospects are brighter and hourly improving. Yesterday's improved services on the L.N.E.R. are being maintained today, with the addition of several important trains. There will be increased services in all districts. A considerable number of trains in the North Bastern area are running, being 32% more than yesterday. The Company cannot guarantee that certain long distance

trains will complete their journey.

HOUR OFFICE reports that in London and the Home Counties no serious trouble occurred yesterd y. The L.C.C.C. service of buses to were working specially but there was some interference with the transport of petrol from Fulher and Hackney Depots. Large numbers of ex Cavalry men and Polo pl yers volunteered and were enrolled as extra mounted police. A crowd praced the town of Brichton during the accreing and visited various works but no disorder occurred. From Newcastle it has reported the Cassorkers were remaining at work and the stocks of soul are adequate. In Cardiff yesterday, during the afternoon a crowd including tram strikers thronged Queen Street and impeded the passage of vehicles, the crowd bowerer was dim ersed without casualities. Some Great Western men returned to work in Cornwall. In LIVERPOOL yest may there was no disorder, a considerable body of ve.unteer labour was unloading ships, no interference reported and some strikers from the Power Station have returned. The Shite Star Liner "CEBRIC" was unloading successfully and one steamer was unloaded only by velunteers.
