The British Gazette was the subject of discussion in the Commons this afternoon on the motion for the adjournment lommander Kenworthy, Liberal, had alleged that the newspaper of which he understood Mr. Churchill was the editor was not publishing a fair summary of the proceedings in Parliament. He said this was an official paper and it sh should attempt to give news fairly and not try to inflame passions; there were hooligans on both sides, the Trade Union leaders were keeping hooligans in Hull and in East End quiet, and nothing should be put in this official organ to inflame passions of the hooligans of the Right to act which would bring reprisals which would lead to things which we would regret in calmer times, Mr. Scrymgeour and Mr. Jack Jones supported Commander Kenworthy's plea, the latter declaring that the Government was using public money to liable Trade Unionists. The House adjourned at 4 o'c. MINERS LEADERS: Mr. A. J. Cook and Mr. Frank Hodges are going by air to attend the International Miners Conference at Ostend, and have booked to return to London on Monday. BRITISH DISARMAMENT DELEGATION. Dispite the strike the British delegation headed by Lords Cecil is leaving for Geneva tomorrow to attend a meeting of the Committee on the composition of the League of Nations Council. They will attend the British Disarmament Conference at the ordinary Council meeting in June. A considerable consignment of mails from various parts of England was conveyed to Belfast today by destroyer from Liverpool. STRIKE BREVITIES: No work in Manchester Ship Canal except for removal of foodstuffs. Hull Police were obliged to disperse strikers in the City Sq. this afternoon. Several were injured. Two passengers trains left Barrow today, these being the first to run since Monday. Isabel Brown, married, and a certificated teacher, who gave her last address as Moscow Soviet Russia, was committed for three months at Pontefract today for a seditious speech at Castleford. Several cotton mills in the Preston district closed today and several others are expected to follow.
